An enthusiastic follower of the Jams, Herb Peck, approached the Seniors Drop-In to see if they would host these popular gatherings. The Seniors Drop-In has been home to the Jams ever since.

For many years the Jams would close down for the summer months. Now, for the pleasure of those who do not get away camping or for a vacation, the Jams are continuing throughout the spring and summer. The only break is over Christmas.
